New Technology Makerspace

During the next several months, library users will witness a transformation in the Adult Library as we relocate the traditional reference collection to make way for a reimagined space dedicated to public access to new technologies. The new space will enable us to offer significantly more tech-related programs and relevant learning opportunities for our community. The technology-learning center will be equipped with high-end computers — both Mac and PC — featuring digital media and production software, desktop publishing, 3-D printing, and drafting software to name a few possible examples. A high quality scanner and wide carriage printer will enable users to capture and output their work to a variety of formats. Plans also include shrinking the service desk and relocating existing public computers to increase public space in the seating area. The library has secured generous funding for this project through New York State Public Library facilities construction grants, thanks to the contin-

ued support of our state representatives Senator Carl Marcellino and Assemblyman Chad Lupinacci.

The Great Give Back: Sat., Oct. 14

South Huntington library patrons are invited to participate in The Great Give Back, a day of community service hosted by libraries in Suffolk County. The events are a fitting follow up to this year's summer reading theme, Build A Better World. Among the activities being sponsored at our library include accepting non-perishable food donations for local food pantries and collecting gently worn children's coats to be donated to the Family Service League. From 11 a.m.-12 p.m., teens in the Young Adult Department will be making toys

for dogs at local animal shelters. The library will also host a Chemo Caps Crochet Workshop from 2-4 p.m., during which patrons can make caps for patients undergoing treatment. Crochet instructor Joanne Cohen will be on hand to assist. Cap patterns will be available. Participants should bring cotton or cotton/acrylic blend yarn (worsted and bulky weight are good), and crochet hooks in size H, I and/or J. Knitters are also welcome. Experienced crocheters and knitters who cannot attend may donate finished caps.
