Budget Vote, Trustee Election

Tuesday, April 4, 3-9 p.m.

The South Huntington Public Library will hold its annual budget vote and trustee election on Tuesday, April 4 from 3-9 p.m. Copies of the proposed spending plan are available in the library and online at www.shpl.info. The proposed budget calls for a .92% increase. For the owner of property assessed at \$3,300, the annual library tax bill would be \$451.57, an increase of \$9.67. Trustee Kate Rea is running for re-election to a five-year term.

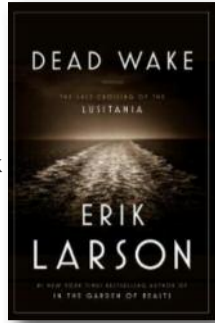

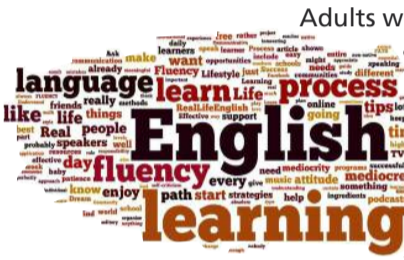
