

How to register online for an adult program:

- Go to our website at www.shpl.info > Events> Adults.
- Find the date of the event you are interested in on the calendar. (If it is a series, such as a fitness class, go to the date of the first class.)
 - Click on the program title.
- The page that appears will have a program description and registration date.
- Assuming that registration has begun, scroll down to the registration form.
- Type in your South Huntington Library card barcode and other fields as needed.
- If there is a fee, enter your credit card information.
 - Click "Register."
- You should then see a confirmation screen. A confirmation notice will also be sent to the email you entered.
- If it is a ticketed event, such as a concert, print the confirmation page and bring it to the show.

- Go to our website at www.shpl.info.
- Click "My Account".
- Enter your South Huntington Library card barcode and PIN.
- If you do not have a PIN, click "Create a Password" and follow the directions on the screen.
- Once you are in your account, you can see what items are checked out and when they are due. You can also update your contact information.
- If you haven't done it already, you may want to enable your reading history so you can begin creating a list to keep track of the books you've read.

Classical Sundays: Pianist Zhu Wang Sun., Dec. 17 at 2:30 p.m.

Praised as "especially impressive" and "a thoughtful, sensitive performer" who "balanced lyrical warmth and crisp clarity" (*The New York Times*), pianist Zhu Wang was awarded First Prize in the 2020 Young Concert Artists Susan Wadsworth International Auditions. In 2019, Zhu was finalist in the Clara Haskil International Piano Competition, and he has been a featured soloist on WQXR's Young Artist Showcase and WFMT's Dame Myra Hess Memorial Concerts. His Carnegie Hall debut made The New York Times' "Best of Classical Music 2021" list.

A native of Hunan, China, Zhu started learning piano at the age of five. He is a graduate of the Music Middle School Affiliated to the Shanghai Conservatory of Music. He received a Bachelor of Music degree from The Juilliard School and a post-baccalaureate diploma at Curtis Institute of Music. He is the recipient of the Gina Bachauer and



Mieczyslaw Munz Scholarship at Juilliard, and the recipient of the Mehlin Prize at Curtis. Zhu is currently pursuing his Master of Music degree, under the tutelage of Robert McDonald and Emanuel Ax. He gratefully acknowledges the support of the Bagby Foundation for the Musical Arts.

This popular resource offers access to public databases, from census records and Social Security to military and immigration records. It also features a Learning Center where you can get tips on tackling your quest, and there are downloadable forms to help you keep track of your research. Ancestry.com Library Edition is only available for use inside the library. Visit the Reference Desk to get started.

Ellis Island

Search the free Ellis Island archives for passenger records and manifests for those who passed through Ellis Island and the Port of New York between 1892 and 1924.

Fold3

Access to military records, including the stories, photos, and personal documents of the men and women who served.

HeritageQuest Online

This resource features U.S. federal census records from 1790-1950 plus searchable published family histories. It also has Revolutionary War-era records as well as Freedman's Bank (1861-1875), which was founded to

serve African Americans, and Native American census records.

MyHeritage Library Edition

Search records from around the world including birth, marriage, death, military, census, and parish records

Passenger and Immigration List Index

Lists are compiled from historical publications, naturalization records, government documents, ship manifests, and other historical sources. Entries include the name and age of immigrant; year and place of arrival, or naturalization; and associated family members who ar-

Historic Newspapers

rived with the entrant.

All About Tech

Your Digital Legacy

Email accounts, social media profiles, photos and documents stored in the cloud, and other digital assets all create a virtual representation of you. What will happen to this virtual representation when you are gone?



Just as you might create a will to distribute physical possessions, you should probably make plans for your digital estate as well. Your executor(s) may need access to important online information, like banking and investment accounts, and family may want to retrieve old photos and videos for memorialization or preservation. Without a plan in place it can be difficult and time-consuming for them to access your online accounts.

Here are general tips and suggestions for preserving your digital legacy; but, be aware these should not be considered legal advice and you should discuss and review your options with an estate planner or lawyer:

- Create an inventory of your accounts and devices. Create a list of all emails, social media profiles, cloud storage accounts, online accounts (financial, government, airline, etc.), and devices like computers and tablets that might contain personal data.
- Safely store passwords. Utilize an online password manager or safely store a physical list of passwords for accounts. Keep notebooks with passwords out of sight when possible.
- Name a digital executor. Appoint a trusted person to manage and secure your digital assets. They should have access to and know how to find any password lists and instructions on how to access your accounts.
- Set a plan for accounts. For each social media profile, email account, etc. decide if you want it memorialized, deleted, or transferred to heirs. Leave behind instructions. Some have built-in tools you can use to automate account deletion after a period of time or transfer control to a designated individual. For example, Facebook and Apple allow you to designate legacy contacts who can access your information after passing.
- Back up important data. External storage drives and cloud storage can be helpful for keeping copies of important documents, as well as photos and videos, in one centralized location
